BLACK HISTORY FACTS:

Shirley Chisolm, , by LTC (Ret) Ruth Ravenell

Born in Brooklyn New York November 30, 1924. She died January 1st 2005 at the age of 80

Shirley Anita St. Heil was her birth given name was a woman who was known for her moral character and her relentless ability to stand up for her community and what she believed.

She learned from an early age the importance of education and the value of hard work both of which she applied to her careers and accomplishments. During the depression phase she and her siblings were sent to Barbados by her parents. She received a British education before returning to the USA. Upon returning to the UNA, she completed a public-school education. Shirley exceeded exceptional in her grades, obtaining a full four-year scholarship. She attended Brooklyn College and received a Bachelor degree in Sociology in 1946. She furthered her education receiving a Master's degree from Columbia University in 1951. Shirley Chisolm was active in community activities, influential in democratic party activities, and influential member of the NAACP. Because of her strong commitment to various activities in 1964 she was elected to New York State Legislature where she served four years.

Behind the Scenes: or, Thirty Years a Slave, and Four Years in the White house by <u>Elizabeth Keckley</u> In 1968, Shirley Chisolm became the first African American elected to Congress of New York 12th district (1968-1983). In 1972. Chisolm was the first African American woman to run for President of the United States. She ran against George McGovern. She received 152 member votes which was an outstanding number. Shirley Chisolm wrote two books, 1970-Unbought and Unbossed an autobiography and 1973- The Good Fight also an autobiography. Shirley Chisolm retired from Congress in 1983: she received the Presidential Medal of Freedom in 2015 from President Barack Obama.

Shirley Chisolm's famous quote: "If they don't give you a seat at the table bring in a folding chair."
